Welsh is a Celtic language spoken in Wales (*Cymru*) by about 740,000 people, and in the Welsh colony (*y Wladfa*) in Patagonia, Argentina (*yr Ariannin*) by several hundred people. There are also Welsh speakers in England (*Lloegr*), Scotland (*yr Alban*), Canada, the USA (*yr Unol Daleithiau*), Australia (*Awstralia*) and New Zealand (*Seland Newydd*).
