- Oasis** is a real oasis in London, with squash courts, a gym and a sauna. Swim in our outdoor pool – open until 9.00 pm all year round.
- Traffic-calmed **Piccadilly Circus** is full of people in the evening, all enjoying the buzz of the big city. It's an amazing and vibrant atmosphere.
- The **Tower of London** is London's castle, built in the 11th century. Visit 1000 years of history and of course don't miss the Crown Jewels.
- Come to the **London Dungeon** for the scariest location in London! Rats, darkness, secrets from the past, and lots of scary surprises! You'll love it!
- Oxford Street** offers nearly two kilometres of world-class shopping, from iconic department stores to classy boutiques. A real shoppers' paradise!
- The **Museum of Brands, Packaging and Advertising** shows how cans, packets, boxes and bottles have changed over the years.
- Hyde Park** is the largest of the parks in Central London. Whether you row on the lake or have a picnic on the grass, it's the perfect place to relax.
- Gorilla Circus Flying Trapeze School:** fun, but not easy! Open-air classes in acrobatics in Regent's Park. Classes cost from £22.50

Fulham – a brilliant place to shop

North End Road Market is a taste of real London, and a far cheaper option than nearby supermarkets. Stalls all along the street sell everything from trousers to batteries. Most of them are fresh fruit and veg sellers, and there's a good fishmonger, an olive stall and two cheese specialists. Dickenson's is the most popular place for buying chicken and steak.

When you've finished shopping, stop off at **Del'aziz**, a wonderful Mediterranean delicatessen and restaurant. Here you can have cakes and pastries, a healthy breakfast, a cooked lunch or an evening meal with wine – there's always something great on the menu. It's the ideal place to sit when you're not in a hurry, or to drink coffee or mint tea with friends. In the summer you can sit outside at big wooden tables, looking out over a nearby church and away from the noise of the traffic. The Fulham restaurant has been so popular that Del'aziz have opened restaurants in other parts of London too. Takeaway service, office deliveries and outside catering are available.

A welcome addition to Fulham Broadway is **Union Market**, which has a farmers' market, a deli, a fruit and veg shop, a bakery and a wine shop. The old tube station ticket hall is now a cafe. At Union Market you'll find good, high-quality food. It isn't cheap, but the quality is far better than in supermarkets. And most organic food shops in London are much more expensive. It's a market where people like to walk around, just looking. There's a relaxed eat-in restaurant with quality British food, open all day, and a deli where you can get take-away sandwiches, salads, quiches – you name it.

Over 12 million people did their shopping at **Fulham Broadway Shopping Centre** last year, and it's no wonder. There are 14 stores, 10 different food outlets, and a 9-screen cinema at Fulham Broadway underground station. And the keep-fit gym upstairs is where Fulhamers can meet and get some exercise. And then you can buy the finest freshly-baked German Bretzels in west London!
